The numerous local fairs which have been held at Florin, Burke and other points throughout the country are attracting increasing attention, and may lead to the revival of the fair on a county-wide scale. These local exhibits give an excellent opportunity for the boys and girls of the county, as well as the older people to show what they have done during the summer months. It is to be hoped that the institution of a county fair will someday be revived. Many of the older residents of the county recall with pleasure the old fairs which were held originally on what is now the county parking lot near the courthouse, and later on the old fair grounds, where the Fairfax High School now stands. The fairs lasted the better part of a week, and were the general meeting place for the people of the county, many of whom did not see each other at any other time of the year.

Child Guidance Course at Falls Church

Dr. James J. Thorpe, formerly Senior Psychiatrist at the Pilgrim State Hospital in New York City, last week became fulltime director of the Red Feather Child Guidance Clinic in Falls Church, succeeding Dr. Thomas A. Harris, now serving on the staff of the U.S. Naval Hospital in Oakland, Calif.

Previously, while serving on their psychiatric staffs, Dr. Thorpe organized and led group therapy projects at the U.S. Public Health Hospital for Drug Addicts at Lexington, Ky., at the U.S. Public Health Clinic and the National Training School for Boys in Washington, and at Federal prisons in Oklahoma and Michigan, as well as at his most recent post in New York.

Dr. Thorpe is already setting up at his Falls Church Clinic weekly sessions of parents on his agency's waiting list. Dr. Thorpe feels that this extension of his clinic's already full schedule should accomplish important results for both his staff and his patients.

Dr. Thorpe plans a continuing schedule of the group meetings, in which new members will replace those who no longer need to participate. In line with his agency's aims to meet community, as well as individual, needs, in cooperation with other Community Chest and public and volunteer services, Dr. Thorpe also plans to meet P-TA groups, and will outline suggestions for their use at a meeting he is addressing at the Fairfax Elementary School on October 2.

Dr. Thorpe is a member of the Washington - Baltimore Psycho-Analytic Institute, where he received his personal analytic training. A graduate of the New York Medical College, he is now staff instructor in absentia there and at the Group Therapy Institute in New York City. He resides in Annandale with his wife and three young daughters and plans to practice psychiatry privately in addition to his clinic duties.
